FROM BARRY

I've enjoyed the questions I've received when telling Globe patrons that we're doing a play called King James. No, it's not about the monarch who sponsored the monumental English translation of the Bible. No, it's not about James Brown, though he does have a great song called "King of Soul." The title is actually a reference to LeBron James, the titan of basketball-and no, you don't need to know anything about the game in order to enjoy the play.

The Globe has produced quite a few sportsthemed shows. We've explored tennis, boxing, baseball, even track and field. Sports are fantastically interesting in the theatre. They are inherently dramatic: built on conflict between two sides, and suffused with emotion and high stakes. *King James* is a sports play... of sorts. Its four scenes correlate to a basketball game's four quarters, and the subject of hoops is a constant throughout. But the play is less interested in sports per se, as a pastime or even as an obsession, than it is in sports as conduit to an even larger theme: friendship.

It's surprising how few plays center on the institution of friendship, especially given how central it is to the human experience. Friendships feature in a million plays, of course, but I'd be hard-pressed to name a dozen in which the rich, complicated relationships between two pals is the primary concern. In this sense, Rajiv Joseph, tonight's playwright, is doing something quite innovative and impressive. Matt and Shawn, his subjects, are very different men who have one thing in common: their love of LeBron and his team. This love bonds them, and somehow their shared passion for the Cleveland Cavaliers connects them and forges in them a deep fondness for each other. As their fortunes ebb and

flow through family challenges, romantic turbulence, and career upheavals, the Cavs-and LeBron—lend them stability. But more, LeBron gives them a place to focus their emotions, a haven for all that's swirling inside them, a safe and steady port in the storm of life. LeBron becomes a language they can speak, a way to express by proxy the intimacies and vulnerabilities that are otherwise too difficult, intimidating, or scary to risk sharing. Joseph's technique is sophisticated in this way. The play's surface is simple, everyday speech—a couple of guys talking sports and kibitzing about life—but that talk reveals big ideas about big things: masculinity, and America, and race, and success, and failure, and heartbreak, and trust. It's a lovely and sneakily affecting piece of writing.

I'm very glad to welcome a lovely man to the Globe to stage it. Justin Emeka is from Ohio, maybe a half hour from LeBron's Cleveland, where he teaches at the prestigious liberal arts academy Oberlin College. He's become a close friend of the Globe over the past few years, working with me on Hamlet, participating in our Classical Directing Fellowship, holding two separate commissions for new work, and being a valued thought partner. His directing career is flourishing, and we're lucky to have his talent, intelligence, and abundant warmth on our campus. Justin's brought together a very talented group of designers and two extraordinary actors to tell this special story, and we're grateful to them all for bringing this meaningful play to San Diego.

Thanks for coming. Enjoy the show.



What drew you to work on this project?

First, it's just a great play, so well written. And it's such an intimate piece. Rarely do you get a chance to dig in with just two actors on such concentrated work. Also, I've lived in northeast Ohio for the past 17 years, so I was very excited when I saw that it was set in Cleveland.

Do you have a strong connection with basketball or with LeBron James in particular?

Definitely, I grew up playing basketball with my brothers. That was what you did, you know? You played basketball and you watched basketball. I remember at the time when LeBron came into the league as an 18-year-old phenom, I still felt like a young phenom at the time, too, in my own field. I think that's what LeBron James was: an invitation for us all to see ourselves as phenomenal—as young people, young artists, young scholars, young business people, trying to break in and find their place in the world. I remember everybody using the term: I'm gonna be the LeBron James of the theatre world, or whatever world. He was a representation of our greatest aspirations in a lot of ways.

Are there other sports heroes who have been meaningful to you in your life?

My son is named after Muhammad Ali. He's been a very influential figure to me in terms of understanding the role of sports and entertainment and merging those with politics and social justice. I think that sports are a game for a reason, and there's something that needs to be playful about it, but it also has a serious and intense impact on our culture. I think sports at their best have a responsibility to society and to culture, to help inspire us to be better human beings, and then inspire us to challenge the possibilities, challenge access for communities. And Muhammad Ali, to me, is someone who really modeled that idea.

How do you think Rajiv Joseph is using basketball in the play?

For one, I think he uses it as a tool for these two men to engage in a relationship and to express their emotions, their feelings, and their aspirations. Some people don't know how to articulate their hearts, but they can articulate their passion for their team, for their heroes. They can engage in complex analysis in sports that is often hard to

apply to their own lives. You can analyze your team's strengths and weaknesses, what your team needs to do in order to win the championship, and in a way it becomes a metaphor for our own ambitions. It even gives you a chance to measure your worth. When you have a championship team, you have a championship city. And unfortunately the inverse is true. When you have a losing team that just can't win, that mentality can rub off on the people too.

But that feeling of being a winner or a loser is so far outside any one fan's control!

And that's what this play is about. Because Cleveland is really trying to overcome a legacy of losing. Cleveland as a city has lost so much that they almost don't know how to win. That's what I think. This play explores these two young men who have each experienced loss so much in their lives. So much that they almost don't know how to recognize or deal with their own wins, because they're used to always coming up short. But with sports, like with life, within every loss, there's the potential for recovery and a potential to win in the next game, or a championship next season. Both of the characters in the play at times get things they really wanted, and then they also have to deal with the emptiness of that and realize there are still deeper holes in their lives that they're looking to fill. And that's where their friendship comes in.

What are some of the other big ideas that the play deals with that intrigue you?

I feel like the heart of the play is about two young men who are both wrestling with loneliness. They have voids in their lives, in their families, and in their relationships. And it explores the importance of friendship, of having a good friend throughout life. One of my favorite lines is: "I think when you get older you realize how much you didn't realize how much certain people mean to you."

How did being in the round impact your ideas about the production?

Being in the round is a challenge because the play is set in basically two places, a wine bar and an antique shop, each of which wants to have a healthy amount of realism to them. But being in the round also gives me an opening through the basketball. You know how we'll all pick up a piece of paper off the floor and we shoot it for the trash can, and some of us turn it into a very intricate, extravagant game—we take it very seriously in that moment, and then we let it go. That happens in the opening moment of the play, and it had me thinking about the importance of the theatre as round, like a sports arena. So with the design, we talked about how we might take advantage of our own little arena here.

What are you hoping an audience will take away from the play?

I hope they'll go away appreciating their own relationships more, maybe thinking about an old friend and perhaps reach out to somebody they may have gone their separate ways from. The play is talking about and looking at the depth of what a good friend can mean to us, and also how our differences can be translated into friendship while still remaining different. Actually, sometimes being different is the basis for a great friendship. \blacksquare

THE PLAY ARTISTS



From being named Rookie of the Year to being the all-time leading scorer of the NBA, LeBron James has had an incredible career filled with drama and excitement. His many achievements have earned him the nickname King James. With four NBA championships and four Most Valuable Player awards under his belt, James is definitely one of the greatest basketball players of all time.

Originally from Akron, Ohio, he has been embraced by every city he has played in as a hometown hero, but none more than Cleveland and the Cavaliers. Growing up, there was little doubt that James would go on to become basketball royalty. He was the youngest high school basketball player to be featured on the cover of *Sports Illustrated*. Immediately after an award-winning high school run, he was drafted by the Cavaliers as the first overall pick of the 2003 NBA draft. It seemed like James had found the perfect place to grow into one of the best players in the league. He was loved by the Cavalier fans. His jersey was the number one seller. However, after seven years of playing for the Cavaliers, James had yet to secure an NBA championship. He then made a decision that turned all the goodwill he had built in Cleveland against him.

In 2010, James decided to join the Miami Heat in a drama-filled televised event called "The Decision." Though many people criticized it as an unnecessary publicity stunt, he used this event to raise over \$5 million for charity. His Cleveland fans responded to this decision to leave the Cavaliers with intense emotions. There were even videos of fans burning his jersey. That year, James was one of America's most disliked athletes. When the Heat faced the Cavaliers later in the season, he was booed every time he touched the ball. It was certainly a low point for James, who has said that he regrets the way that he dealt with the situation. After winning two NBA championships with the Heat, James returned to Cleveland in 2014 to lead the Cavaliers to the victory in the NBA championship, the city's first professional sports title win in 52 years. Though some die-hard fans might have continued to hold his departure against him, most people were thrilled to see him carry their team to victory.

There is no doubt that James has earned his place as a hero on the court, but his work outside of the sport is what has led to him being named as one of *Time* magazine's 100 Most Influential People in the World multiple times. He has represented the U.S. in the Olympics three times, bringing home two gold medals and one bronze. His charity, the LeBron James Family Foundation, is based in his hometown of Akron, Ohio. It has supported scholarships and education programs for children, medical centers, and housing initiatives. James has embraced the platform that his celebrity has granted him to speak out on political issues he feels strongly about, including police brutality and the decision to overturn Roe v. Wade. From being one of the most hated athletes in America to his current status as a basketball legend, LeBron James has certainly earned his title as King James.

BARRY EDELSTEIN

(Erna Finci Viterbi Artistic Director) is a stage director, producer, author, and educator. His Globe directing credits include *The Winter's Tale, Othello, The Twenty-Seventh Man*, the world premiere of *Rain*,

Picasso at the Lapin Agile, Hamlet, the world premiere of *The Wanderers*, the American premiere of *Life After*. Romeo and Juliet, What We Talk About When We Talk About Anne Frank, and, during the pandemic, Hamlet: On the Radio. He also directed All's Well That Ends Well as the inaugural production of the Globe for All community tour, and he oversees the Globe's Classical Directing Fellowship program. In addition to his recent Globe credits, he directed The Wanderers Off Broadway with Roundabout Theatre Company this year and The Tempest with the Los Angeles Philharmonic at Walt Disney Concert Hall in 2018. As Director of the Shakespeare Initiative at The Public Theater (2008–2012), Edelstein oversaw all of the company's Shakespearean productions as well as its educational, community outreach, and artist-training programs. At The Public, he staged the world premiere of The Twenty-Seventh Man, Julius Caesar, The Merchant of Venice, Timon of Athens, and Steve Martin's WASP and Other Plays. He was also Associate Producer of The Public's Broadway production of The Merchant of Venice starring Al Pacino. From 1998 to 2003 he was Artistic Director of Classic Stage Company. His book

Thinking Shakespeare is the standard text on American Shakespearean acting. He is also the author of Bardisms: Shakespeare for All Occasions. He is a graduate of Tufts University and the University of Oxford, where he studied as a Rhodes Scholar.



TIMOTHY J. SHIELDS

(Audrey S. Geisel Managing Director) joined The Old Globe as Managing Director in 2017. In his time in San Diego, he has enjoyed becoming involved in the community. He currently serves as a board

member of the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce's LEAD program; an advisory board member of the San Diego Downtown Partnership; and Vice President of the Balboa Park Cultural Partnership. He brings to San Diego many decades of not-for-profit theatre experience. He was Managing Director of Princeton, New Jersey's McCarter Theatre Center (2009-2017); Milwaukee Repertory Theater (1998-2009); and Geva Theatre Center in Rochester, New York (1992-1998). He has also held administrative positions at Children's Theatre Company in Minneapolis, Denver Center Theatre Company, and McCarter Theatre Center in an earlier period of his career. He served as President of the League of Resident Theatres and as Vice President of the board at Theatre Communications Group. He has been the Chair of the ArtPride NJ board; a member of Milwaukee's Latino Arts Board; and a board member of the Cultural Alliance of Greater Milwaukee. He holds a B.F.A. in Drama Production from Carnegie-Mellon University in his hometown of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

INTERVIEW BY ADENA VARNER

At The Old Globe, we carefully craft pathways to lifelong engagement opportunities for members of our community so that they feel connected to all that is happening at our theatre. One of the ways we engage is by facilitating theatre-based community workshops, and this season we are hosting a series connected to our summer production of *Henry 6*. The director, our very own Barry Edelstein, had a brilliant vision to radically include community members in a way that would revolutionize the discussion of Shakespeare being for all people.

Arts Engagement Programs Associate Soroya Rowley is now at the helm of bringing these experiences to the community with the H6 Epic Workshop Series.

Could you tell us about the play and why the Globe is producing it?

These plays are the only ones in Shakespeare's canon that the Globe has not yet produced. So this is an important milestone for us. They were also Shakespeare's first. You can see him testing out ideas that he would use in later works. For example, Queen Margaret was a source of inspiration for other famous characters, like Lady Macbeth, and like the Queen of Hearts in *Alice in Wonderland* and Cersei Lannister in *Game of Thrones*. In fact, the War of the Roses is the main inspiration for the entire *Game of Thrones* series. If you are a fan of that series, like me, you may see connections between it and *Henry 6*.

What is the H6 Epic Workshop Series?

Because the production is so massive, we knew it would literally take a village to produce. And we wanted to

design an experience for members of our community to more deeply engage with all aspects of the show. So over the last two years we set out to collaborate with community partners across San Diego with the H6 Epic Workshop Series and its three phases.

Can you describe these three phases?

In *Playing Henry*, we did a deep dive into 10 of the plays' most prominent characters, and compared what historians say about each person to Shakespeare's take. At the end of each session, participants wrote their own short pieces inspired by the characters and the themes they represent in the play. Then we collected those writings and wove them with some of Shakespeare's text to create a special one-night-only staged reading event in December 2022.

In *Making Henry*, members of our design team are working with community participants to create key elements of the show, including projections, sound effects, set, props, and costumes.

And in *Performing Henry*, participants will join the cast of *Henry 6* for walk-on roles, filled by over 200 different community members throughout the run of the show. Each performance will showcase different folks from San Diego.

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
